

## Cub Scout Pack Helps

100 Service Projects – 100 Days  
Centennial Celebration

We understand the concept of a Service Project is new for many Cub Scout Packs, while Boy Scout Troops have been involved with Eagle Scout project for many years.

We hope this summary will assist your Pack in working through the process of selecting and successfully completing your part in our Council's celebration of 100 years of Scouting in America.

**Project Selection:**

Start with your Charter Organization; Ask them what your Pack can do for them. This is an excellent opportunity to work closely with an important friend of your unit. If you are unable to identify a suitable project with your Charter Organization, consider these alternatives:

1. Local Park Board
2. Local school
3. Churches and/or Synagogues
4. County Park
5. Local Police and/or Fire Department

**Project Guidelines:**

**Leave a Legacy.** Look for a project that will leave a positive, lasting reminder of our celebration of 100 years of Scouting in America.

**Involvement.** Remember to ask the youth in your Pack what they may want to do. Discuss with them the concepts we find in the Cub Scout Promise, "To help other people" and in the Cub Scout Law, "The Cub Scout give goodwill". You may want the Cub Scouts to meet with their teachers and/or school administrators to discuss possible projects.

**Teamwork.** If you continue to have difficulties with the selection process, you may want to discuss the possibility of sharing a project with one of the many local Boy Scout Troops. This is a great opportunity to build the relationship between Cub Scouts and Boy Scouts.
