Scout Executive Report




On behalf of the 5,577 registered youth and 2,056 registered adult volunteers, the Potawatomi Area Council is pleased to present you with the 2019 Annual Report. 2019 was a successful year full of positive changes and enhancements to develop the next generation of community leaders. This year was special because it was the first time in the history of the Boy Scouts of America, that we welcomed girls to our Scouts BSA program, impacting more youth and instilling in them the values of Scouting.

The Council saw a very strong financial year in 2019, ending with a balanced budget, but more importantly, we were able to invest over \$170,000 in Camp Long Lake. Camp improvements included new GPS Units, staff housing buildings that will also provide off-season rentals to units, new stand-up paddle boards for Aqualand, and a new lawn mower. Camp Long Lake continues to be the jewel of the Council and we will continue to invest in its future.

New activities were abundant in 2019. Despite a storm that destroyed over 1,500 trees at Camp Long Lake, we were able to open on time - due to a very dedicated volunteer group - and as a result, we served 996 youth at summer camp. Our Scouts participated in several high quality programs like: Winter Blast, Swamp Fox, River Rats, Day Camp, Webelos Resident Camp, Creep-O-Ree, National Youth Leadership Training to name a few. My commitment to our Scouts, Leaders, donors, and you is to maintain these great programs and expand them to a growing number of Scouts. I am grateful to all who helped make 2019 so successful and more excited about what we can do to change the lives of future Scouts in our community.





HIGHLIGHT STORY



Hans Schiefelbeins' Eagle project was comprised of a two phase; supporting an Honor flight and an Oconomowoc High School assembly paying tribute to the 100th anniversary of the end of World War I.

On Saturday, October 13, 2018, Hans secured a bus for veterans and Scouts BSA youth to take everyone from Oconomowoc to greet a Stars and Stripes Honor Flight for veterans at General Mitchell International Airport, in Milwaukee. As a special touch, Hans set up a line of 10 Scouts to do a silent salute, to the veterans, as they exited the plane and walked into a large welcome group.

On Friday, November 9, 2018, Hans created and held a Veterans Recognition Assembly at Oconomowoc High School for over 2,200 guests to recognize the 100th anniversary of the end to World War I and honor all veterans and. The assembly included keynote speakers, Retired US Navy Vice Admiral Dirk Debbink and World War II Veteran Jerry Stern. At the end of the presentation, Hans presented Oconomowoc High School with "Thank You For Your Service" plaque to be hung in their hall to pay tribute to all veterans.



Hans' project took 78 volunteers a total of 501 hours to complete. To make his project successful, Hans raised almost \$7,000 from over 100 donors. In the end, Hans only needed \$5,000, so he donated the remaining funds to a local veterans organization.


Operating Budget


